
Julian J. Robinson Member of Parliament's 4th Annual Constituency Report South East St. Andrew December 31, 2015

Commitment to accountability – publishing annual reports

- As I have done for the last three years to mark the annual anniversaries of my election as Member of Parliament, I am again publishing an account of my work over the last year
- This report highlights some of the initiatives and projects undertaken during the calendar year of 2015

Commitment to a participatory democracy – hosting Constituency Development Fund consultations

- I hosted two Constituency Development Fund consultations. The first took place on April 16, 2015 at the Unity Church Hall in the Trafalgar Division and the second on May 7, 2015 at the Christ Church Hall in Vineyard Town
- At the consultations, I presented on the projects undertaken, the monies expended under the CDF and sought recommendations from residents on how the CDF should be used for the new financial year
- Presentations were also done by Councillors Andrew Swaby (Vineyard Town) and Kari Douglas (Trafalgar), representatives of the CDF Project Office, the HEART Trust NTA and the Social Development Commission(SDC)



Summary of activities done in 2015



HUMAN AND SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

The National Unattached Youth Program launched

- The program is targeted at young persons aged 17 30 who are not in a job or studying
- 128 young persons were selected from the constituency
- 20 are part of the Internship Program where they are placed in a job to get real life experience and will also receive certification
- 47 were placed in training programs at the International University of the Caribbean doing Food & Beverage and Data Operations
- 61 were placed in training programs at Corner Stone Ministries doing auto mechanics and Data Operations
- They are pursuing 1 year programs which will result in NVQJ Level 2 certification
- HEART provides a stipend for the participants

8 Summer camps held across the constituency

- 8 Summer camps were held targeting 1,000 students across 7 communities (Nannyville, Swallowfield, Jacques Rd, McGregor, Franklyn Town, Woodford Park, Slipe Road)
- 4 categories of students
 - Ages 4-6 pre primary stage
 - Ages 7-9 preparing for the Grade 4 Tests
 - Ages 10-12 preparing for GSAT
 - Ages 12-15 young teenagers
- A standardized curriculum was developed for consistency across the camps
- Pre and post assessments were conducted to determine those students needing special intervention
- The students preparing for GSAT used a special locally developed software application for GSAT students

A special summer camp was held at Ja Biz Town for 90 students to introduce them to the world of business

- JaBizTown
 (www.jajamaica.org/ja_biztown) is an initiative of Junior Achievement Jamaica, the Ministry of Education and a number of private sector partners, based at the Caenwood Centre on Arnold Road
- It features a comprehensive learning curriculum that focuses on the student's role in the economy. After the completion of several weeks of specialized in-class learning, students will apply for jobs at various companies at JA BizTown. It consists of a mini-city consisting of several real-life private sector businesses, that will allow students to work in various roles in a simulated economy



9 teenagers participated in a 12 week entrepreneurship training program and established a hat making business

Hats off to nine creative inner-city teenagers

NINE TEENAGERS from two Kingston communities who have benefited from entrepreneurial training have come together to form their own small business.

... The seven females and two males from the Arnold Road and Allman Town creas are now engaged in making lasts and hair bows.

... They participated in a 12-week programme initiated by Member of Parliament for South East St Andrew Julian Robinson and conducted by the Junior Achievement programme under its Company of Entrepreneurs programmes.

... During the training, held from May 9 to July 25 at the Caenwood Centre in Kingston, the teens learnt how to start and operate a small business.

Areas covered include product development, start-up capital, marketing a product, conducting a market survey, setting prices, and conducting a cost-benefit analysis. The training also included leadership and work-readiness skills.

The teens, a mix of students and unattached youth, are now diligently working towards the development and promotion of their 'Kick Out' brand, consisting of bucket hats and bows that have been fashioned into hair accessories.

They have sold 42 shares at \$200 each, raising start-up capital of \$8,400, which was matched by Junior Achievement Jamaica. They are currently in the process of marketing their products.

SUMMER TRAINING

Robinson, according to JIS News, said that Junior Achievement Jamaica was contacted and invited to engage the Syoung people in the Amold Road and Allman Town communities in some kind of entrepreneurship training during the summer as a means of "changing their mindset and creating micro businesses".

While the nine were part of a group of 20 who started the programme, Robinson said he was happy they stuck with the training.

prencurship. The programme has already been introduced to 40 high schools islandwide.

Director of programmes at Junior Achievement Jamaica Yanique Taylor told JIS News that the Junior Achievement Company of Entrepreneurs is the "signature out-of-school programme" that focuses on teaching young people basic skills associated with being an entrepreneur.

"We don't decide what the business is. They determine, from market research, what they think will make a good product in today's market at a good price point. These (nine) young people decided they wanted their product to be bucket hats. They come up with the concept on their own and learnt how to manage their business," she said.

She noted that the participants have an opportunity to advance their training,


"We have a follow-up programme called the Youth Entrepreneurship Initiative, which entails a two-day business workshop to help them strengthen their entrepreneurship skills. They comqualify for small-business loans and continue their business at a highen level. They also receive support in registering their business," she said.

Robinson said that he would encourage young people to get involved in entrepreneurship training as a way of reducing unemployment and spurring micro enterprise development

"Jobs are difficult to find, and this is a way that they can use entrepreneurship to carn a living for themselves and provide economic empowerment for themselves. It's important to introduce entrepreneurship training from an early age because it's a skill that needs the training so you can become better at it?" he noted.

Over 100 youth participated in entrepreneurship workshops

- In collaboration with the NYS, 1 day workshops on entrepreneurship were held for youth aged 17-25 years old
- The workshops created awareness of entrepreneurship as a viable alternative to seeking a job
- There was also a component on personal development and deportment



- The training course was also used as a method of recruitment for Sutherland Global's contact centres in Kingston

- Some of the objectives of the program were to:

 - Instill positive values and attitudes

INFRASTRUCTURE AND WORKS

The Nannyville Health Centre was refurbished and reopened serving the needs of a large community

- The health centre was originally constructed in the 1970s when the Nannyville housing was built but had never been operational
- Due to the location on Mountain View Ave, the health centre serves the needs of not just residents of Nannyville, but many other communities and eases the burden on the hospitals



JEEP was used to construct a new community centre in Monaltrie, repair gullies and more than 10 roads







Infrastructural works undertaken in JEEP Phase 5

<u>Under this program the following roads have been completed</u>

- Lilford Avenue
- Hardie Terrace
- Cunningham Avenue
- Downer Lane
- Sackville Road

Work has commenced on JEEP Phase 6. The following roads will be repaired

- Crieffe Road (completed)
- Tremaine Road (completed)
- Mavis Avenue (in progress)
- Deanery Terrace (in progress)
- Spaulding Ave off Arnold Road
- South Hopefield Avenue

Solar photovoltaic panels were installed at three Community Access Points (CAP) sites

The three CAP sites have computer labs

- Jacques Road community centre
- McGregor Gardens community centre
- Deanery Road
- The solar PV project was funded by the New Zealand Fund
- The installations should realise a 70% reduction in the electricity bills and make the computer labs more sustainable



McGregor Gardens was selected for pilot project to tackle electricity theft –successful results achieved

- In McGregor Gardens, the scope of the project includes
 - Opening of a JPS service centre at the community centre
 - Upgrading the electricity distribution capacity by installing new poles and lines
 - 200 households were rewired and pre paid metres installed
 - Installation of LED street lights
 - Distribution of energy efficient bulbs
 - Training of 4 persons in electrical installation
 - Training and education programs on electricity conservation

Christmas Treats for children were held in 9 communities

- Another health fair was hosted at the McGregor Gardens community centre on November 28, 2015 in collaboration with JPS








PLANS FOR 2016

The completion of the Franklyn Town multi-sports complex

- The complex will host a FIFA size football field, netball and basketball courts and spectator stands
- The project is funded by the JSIF and is scheduled for completion by the 1st Quarter of 2016



The completion of the refurbishing of the Jacques Road community centre


- The Citizen Security and Justice Programme has undertaken a project to refurbish the centre which includes plumbing and electrical works, installation of windows and doors and the construction of a kitchen, resource room and office
- The work should be completed by the 1st Quarter of 2016
